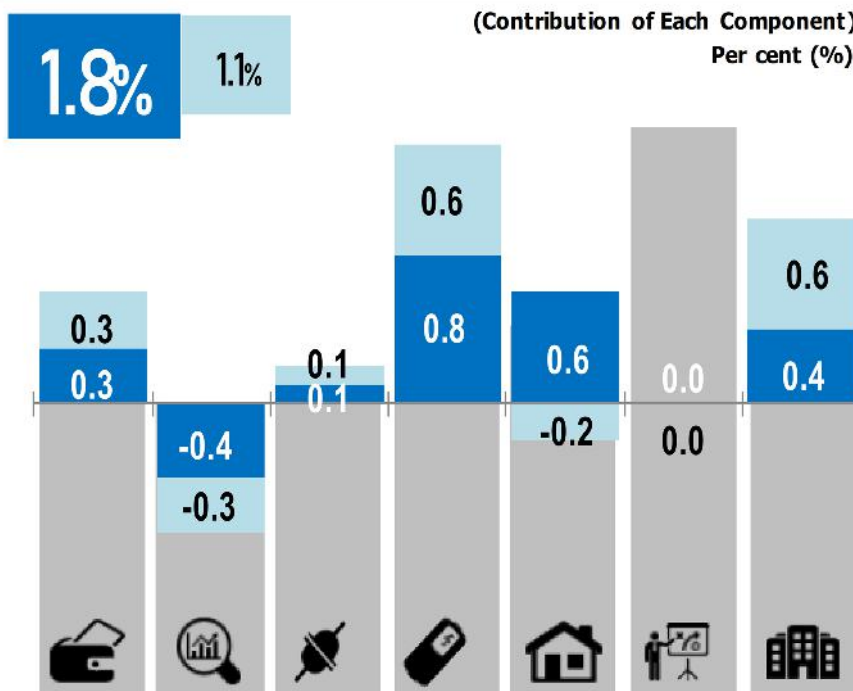
# ECONOMIC INDICATORS, MARCH 2021

Malaysia's Leading Index (LI) continued to trend up in March 2021 posted a double-digit growth, 17.3 per cent year-on-year to 113.3 points (March 2020: 96.6 points). This was the highest year-on-year growth recorded primarily as a result of the sharp drop in March 2020 following the earlier restrictions to curb the global pandemic and mainly influenced by the strong growth in Number of Housing Units Approved, Real Imports of Other Basic Precious & Other Non-ferrous Metals and Number of New Companies Registered.

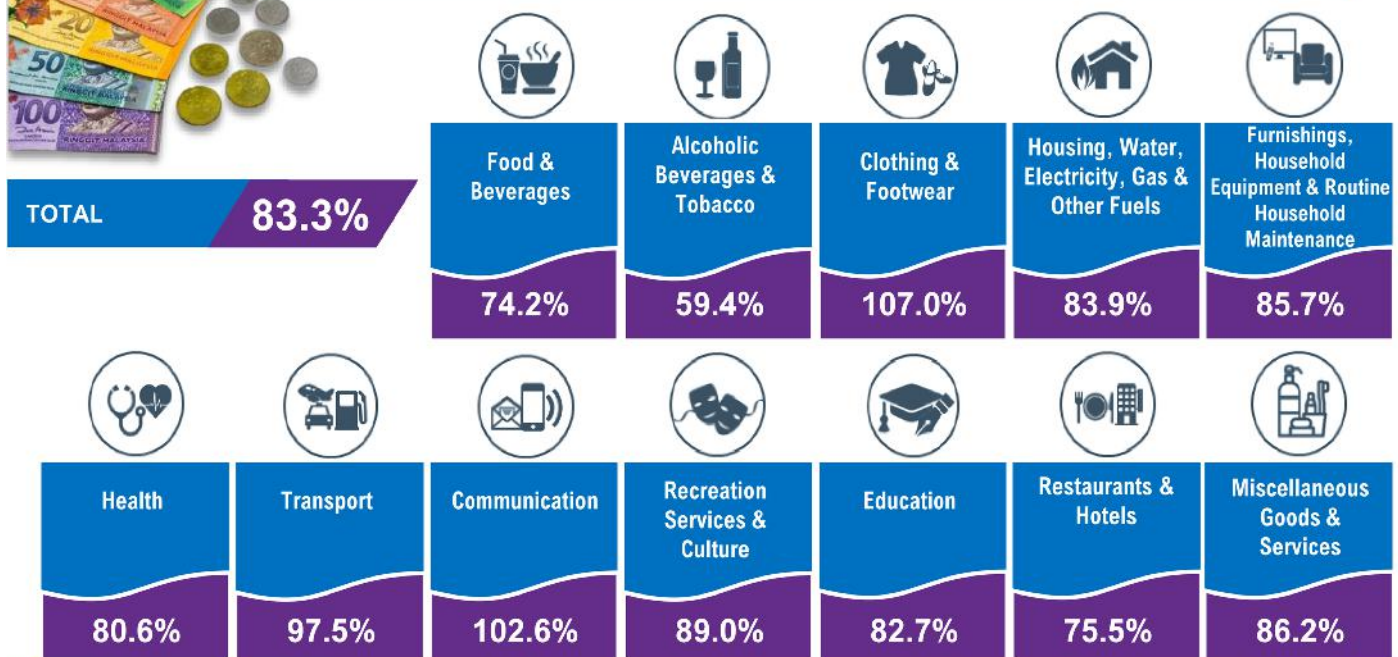

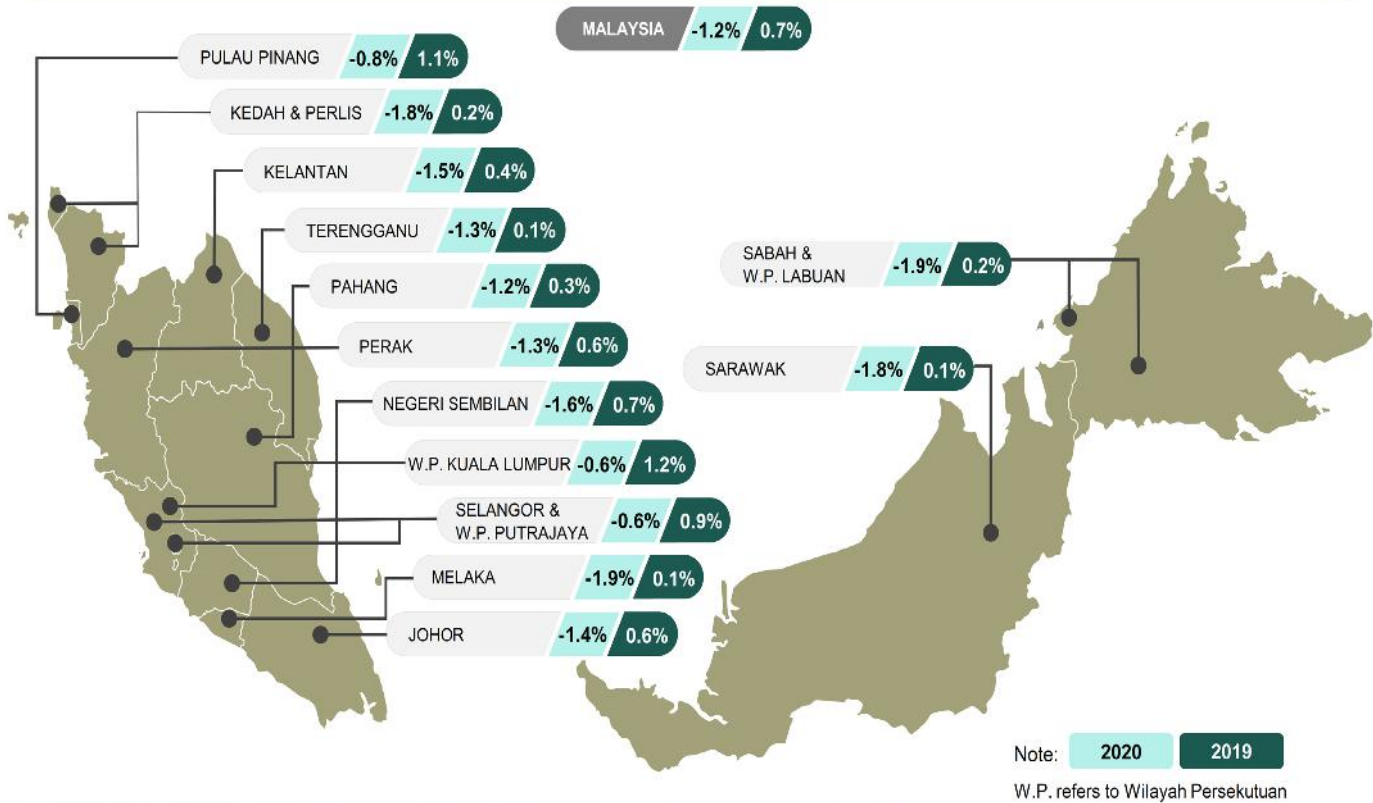

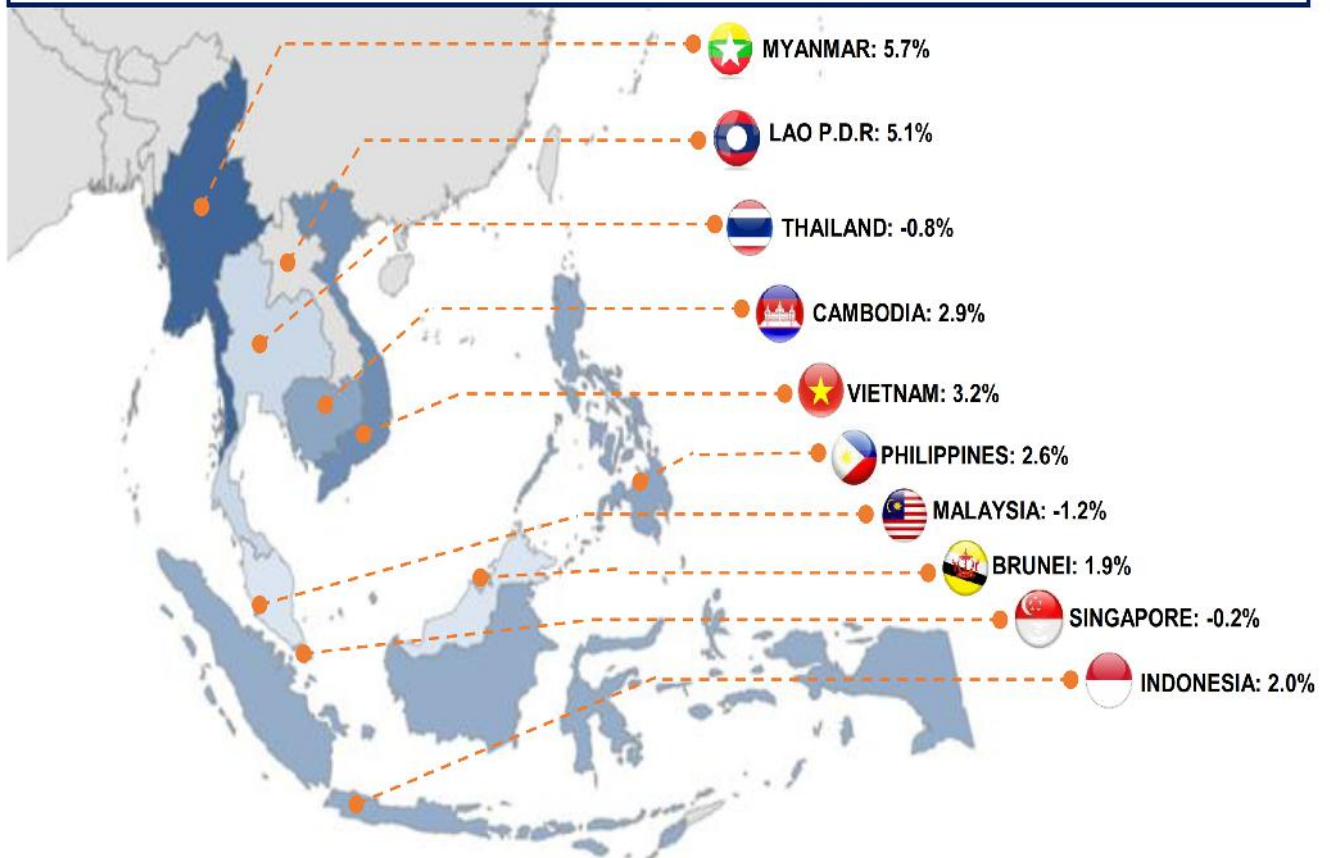

## INFLATION OF ASEAN COUNTRIES, 2020

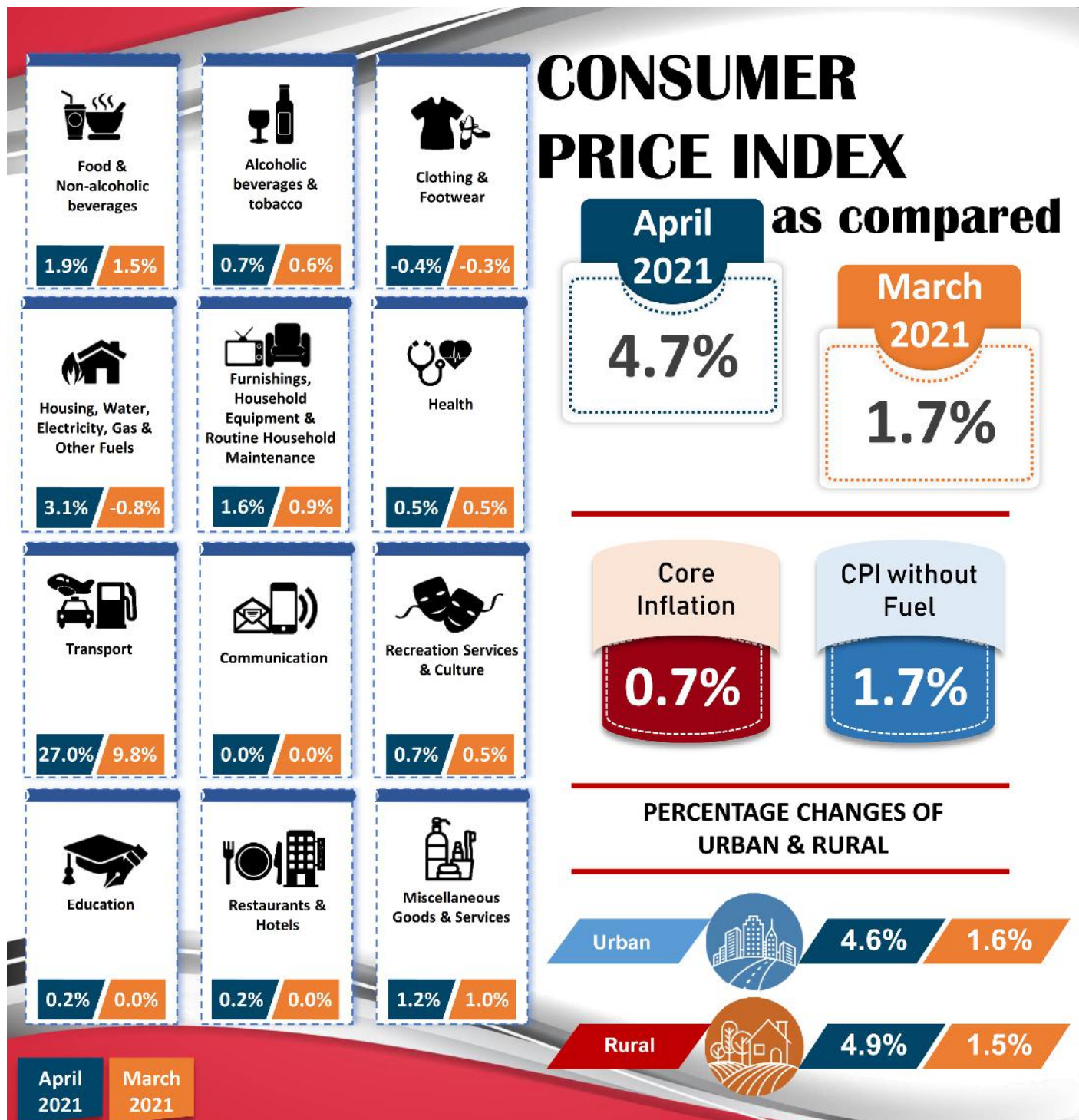

## CPI, APRIL 2020

Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 4.7 per cent in April 2021 to 123.1 as against 117.6 in the same month of the preceding year. The increase in the overall index was driven mainly by Transport (27.0%); Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas & Other Fuels (3.1%); Food & Non-Alcoholic Beverages (1.9%); Furnishings, Household Equipment & Routine Household Maintenance (1.6 %) and Miscellaneous Goods & Services (1.2%). Meanwhile, the CPI for the period of January to April 2021 increased 1.6 per cent as compared to the same period last year. On a monthly basis, CPI increased 0.2 per cent as compared to March 2021. The increase was attributed by Food & Non-Alcoholic Beverages (0.3%); Furnishings, Household Equipment & Routine Household Maintenance (0.3%); Recreation Services & Culture (0.2%); Restaurants & Hotels (0.2%); Education (0.2%); Transport (0.1%) and Miscellaneous Goods & Services (0.1%).

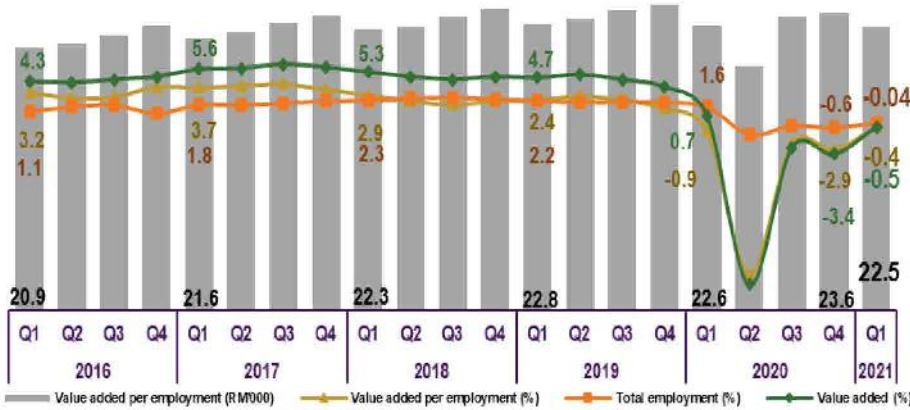

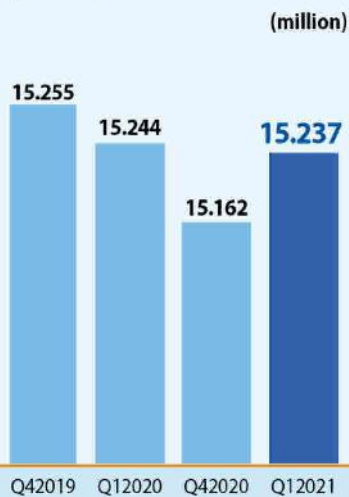


## LABOUR MARKET, Q1 2021

In Q1 2021, the number of employed persons recorded a slight year-on-year decline by 7 thousand persons to 15.24 million persons with the employment-to-population ratio dropped 1.1 percentage points to 65.3 per cent. The unemployment rate stood at 4.8 per cent compared to 3.5 per cent in Q1 2020.

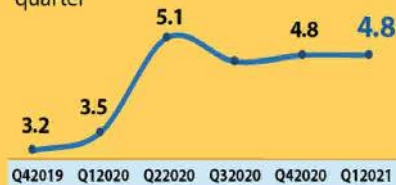

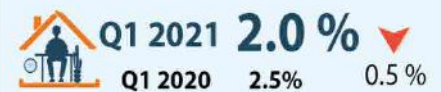

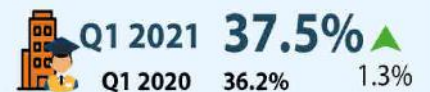

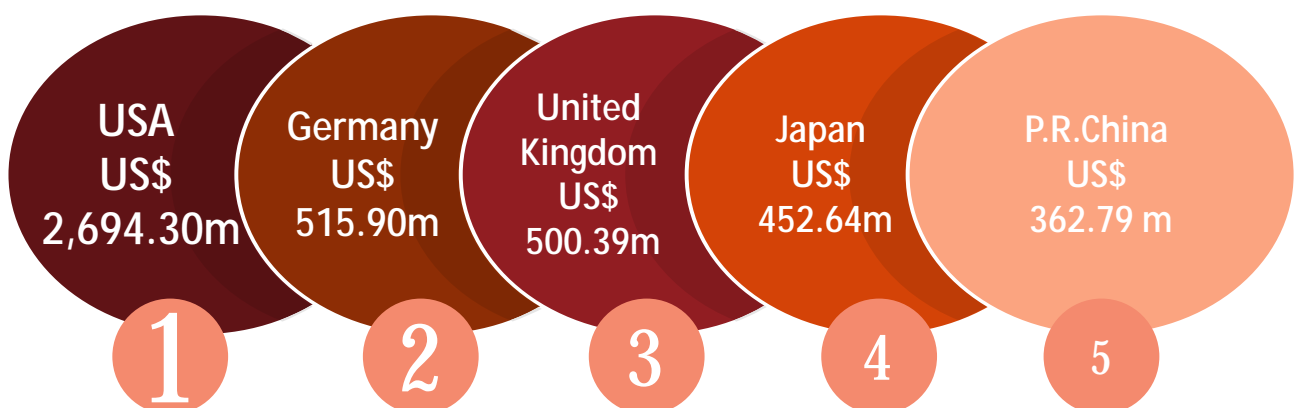

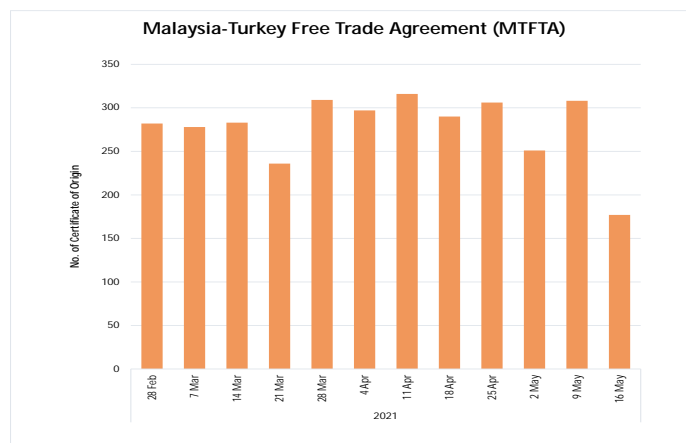
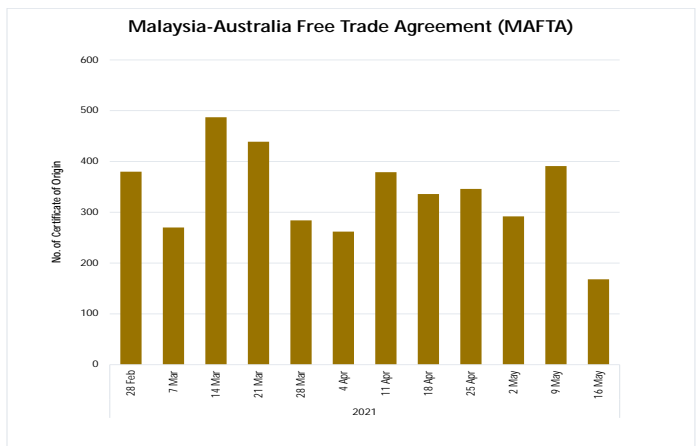
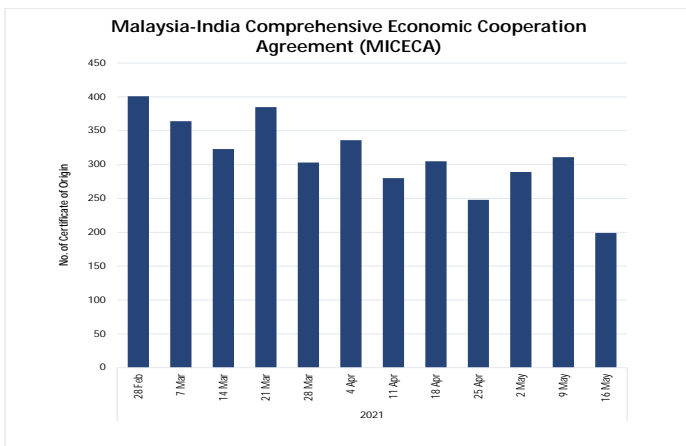
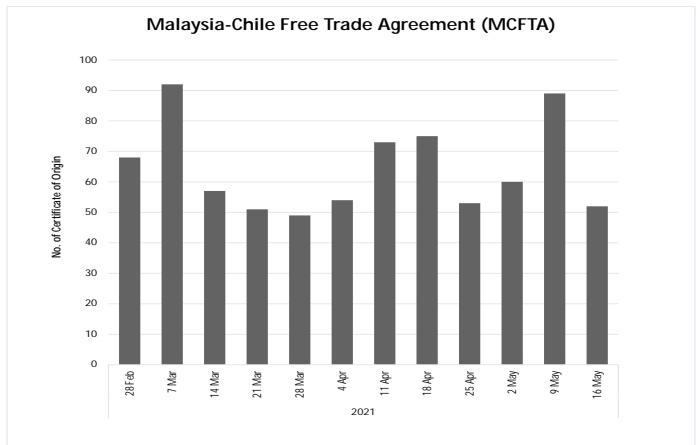
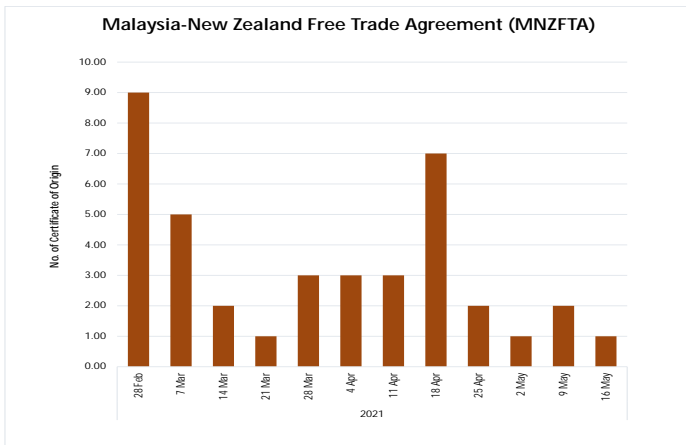
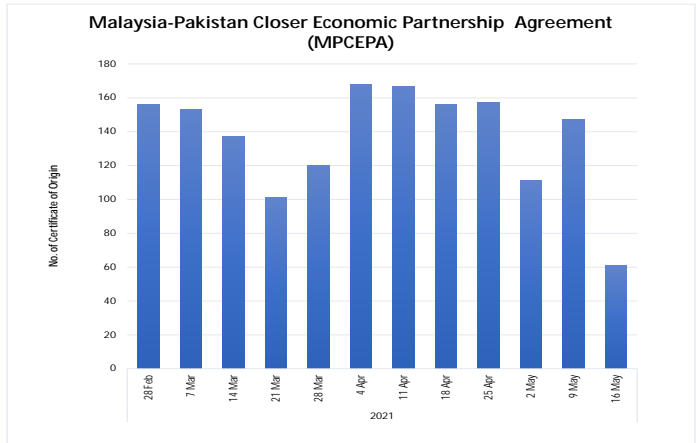
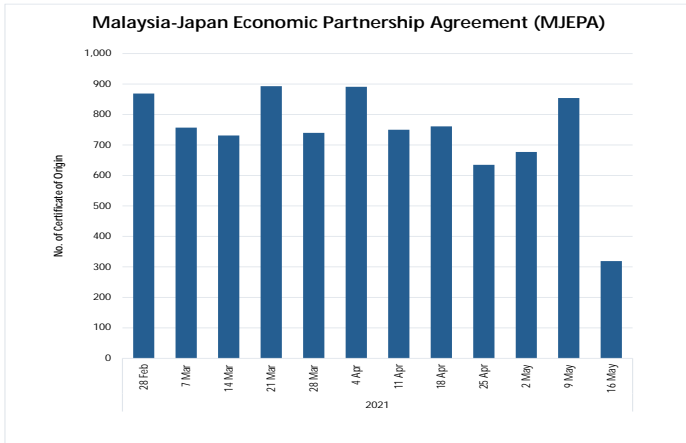
# Regional FTA Number of Preferential Certificates of Origin (PCOs)

# Bilateral FTA Number of Preferential Certificates of Origin (PCOs)



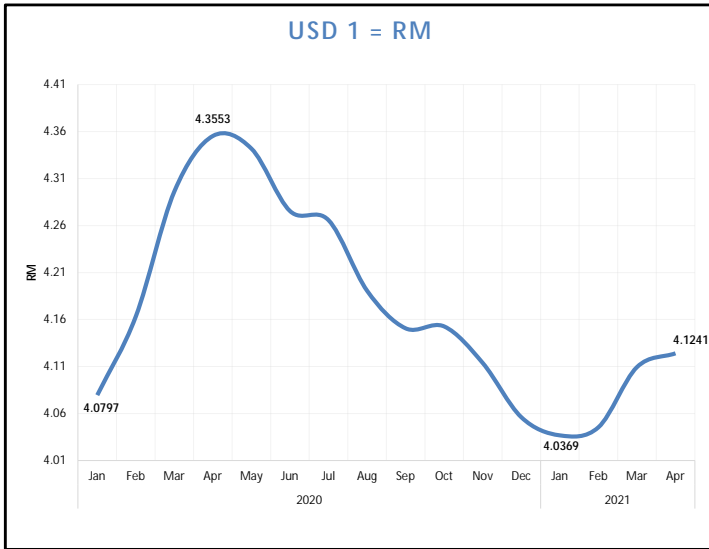
