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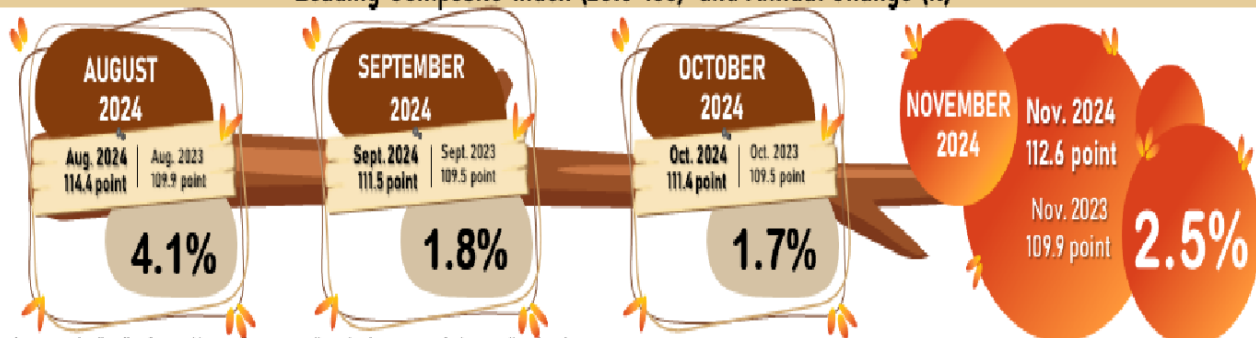

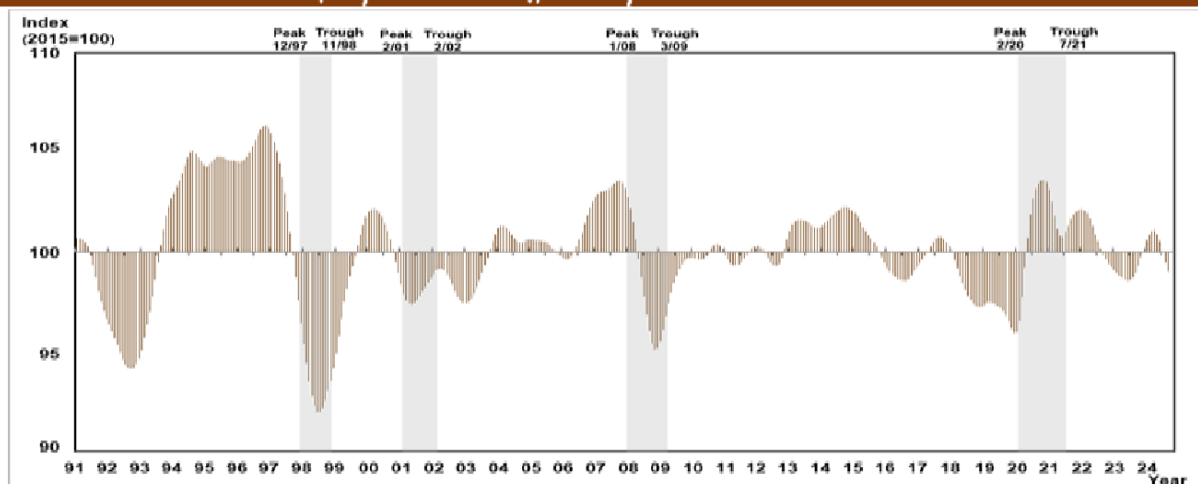

Leading Composite Index (2015=100) and Annual Change (%)

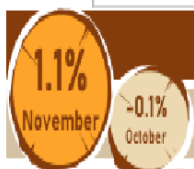

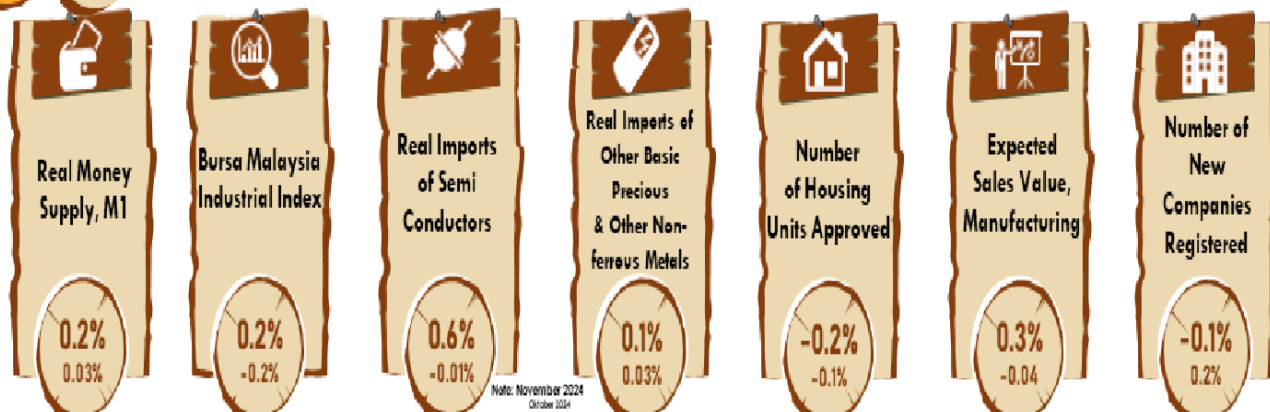
Leading Composite Index (Long Term Trend = 100) and Business Cycle

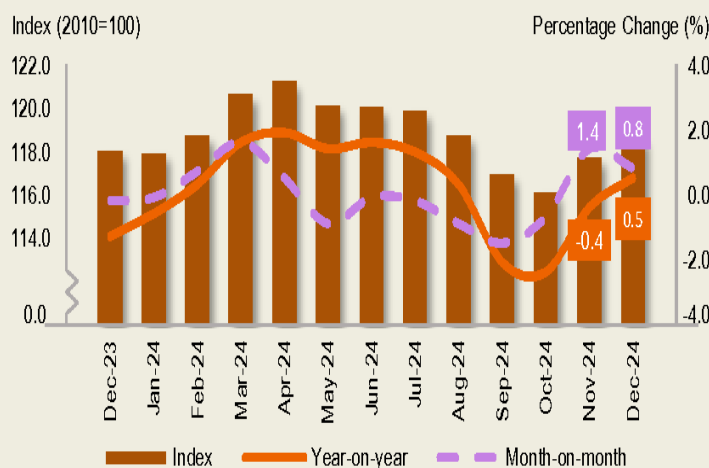

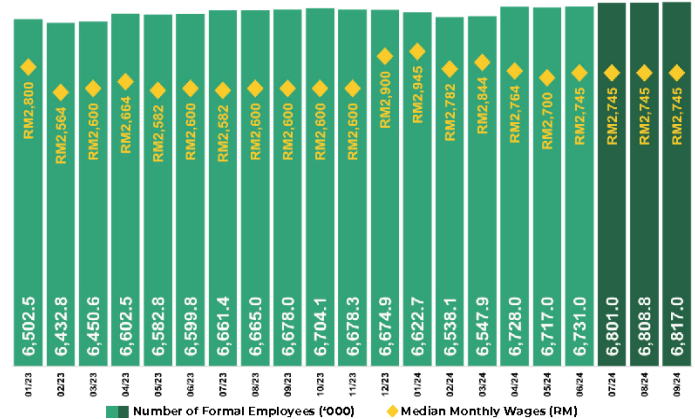

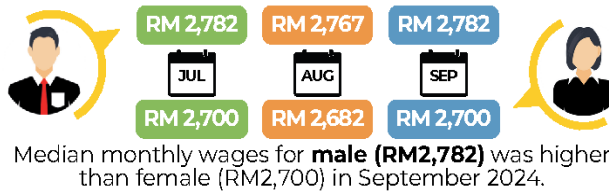

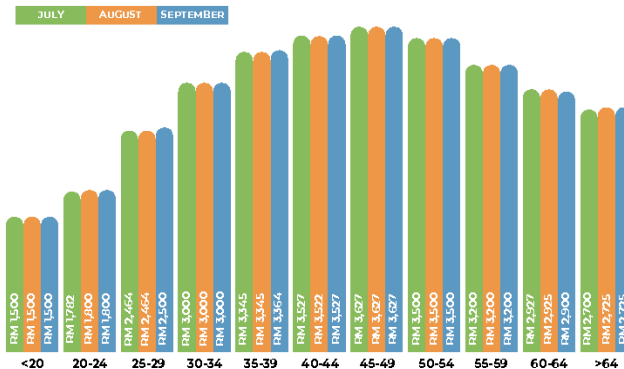

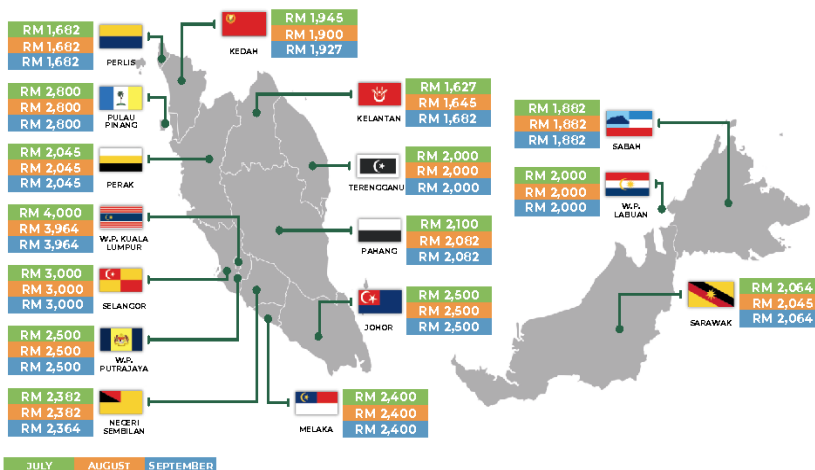
Chinese formal employees recorded the **highest** median monthly wages in September 2024 (**RM4,200**).

CONCEPT & DEFINITION

Wages refer to all remuneration paid to employees, including bonuses, commissions and allowances, during the reference period.

The **Median** refers to the middle observation in a set of data arranged in a sequence. The median wage is used to give a more accurate picture of the "average wage", as the determination of the median is not affected by extreme values.

SCOPE & COVERAGE

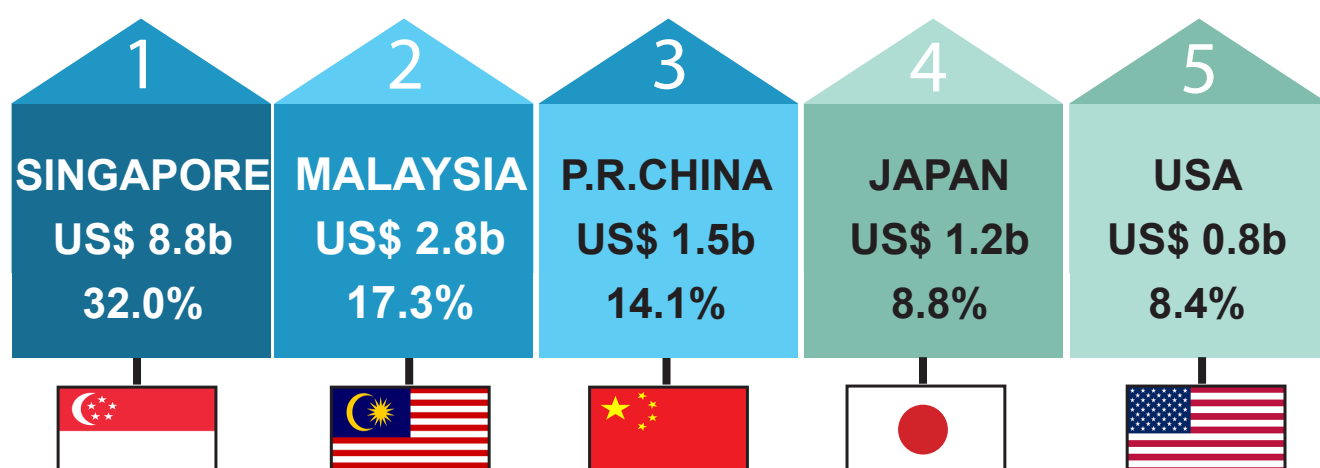
These statistics is based on the administrative data, including data on the mandatory contribution of retirement savings by the private and non-pensionable public sectors and data on the contribution of social security insurance from various agencies. The data focus only on the citizen formal employees and does not cover employed persons fall under non-standard employment, including own-account workers and unpaid family workers.

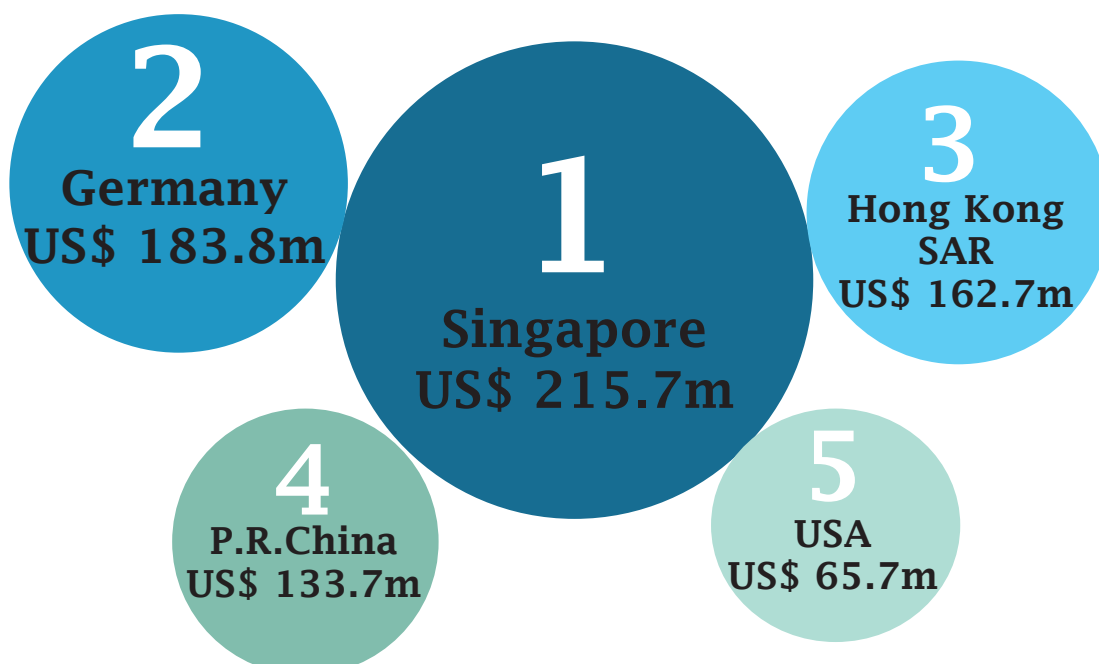

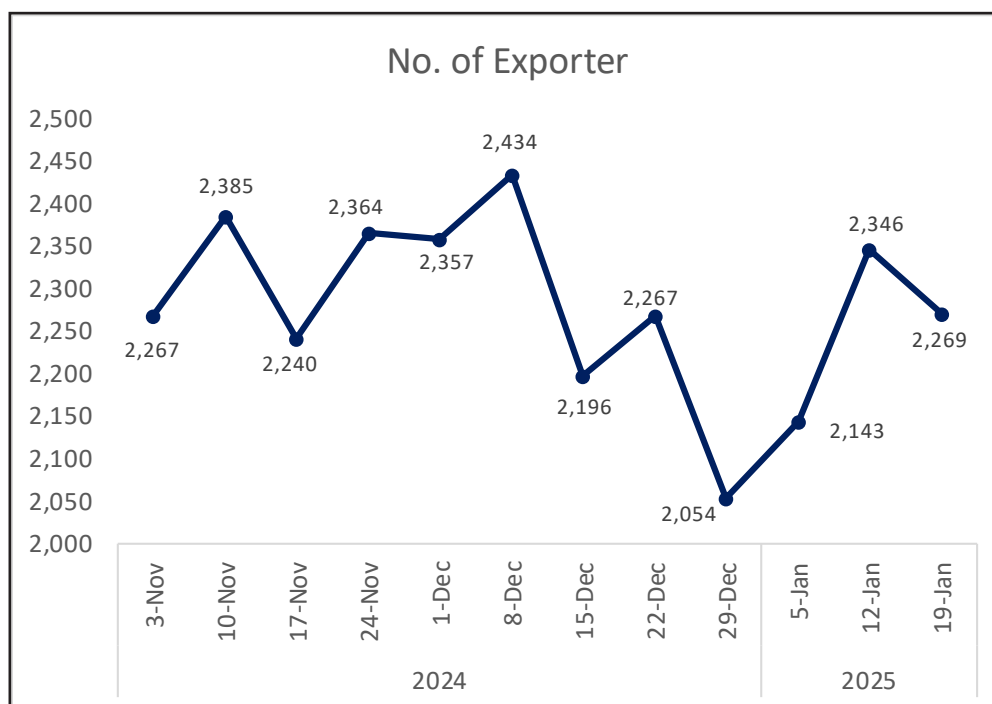

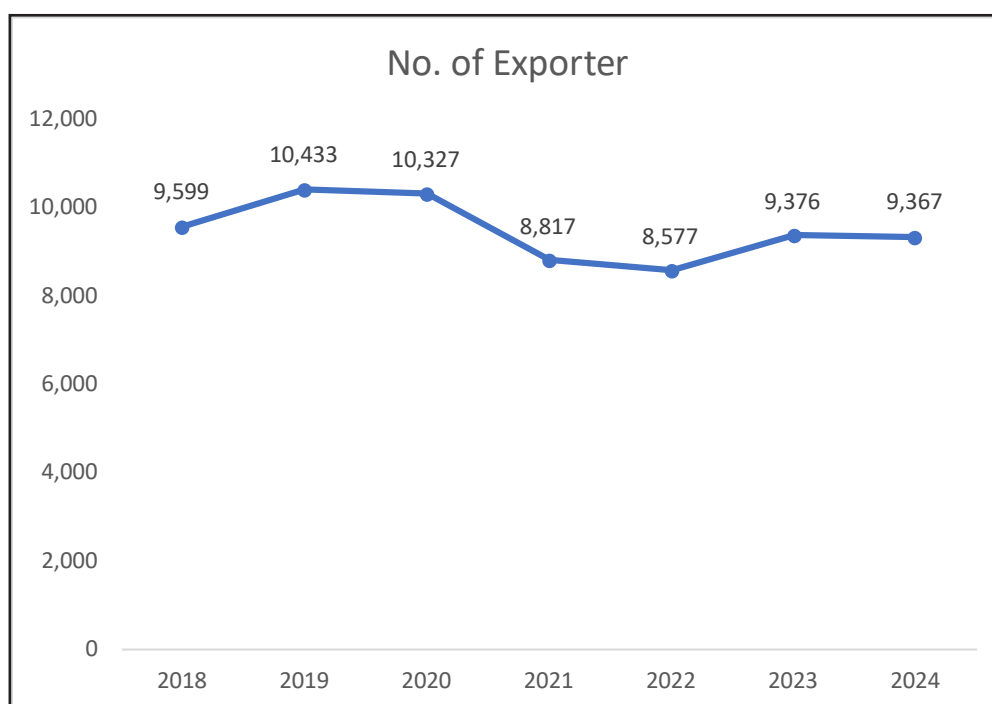


Number of Exporter using Preferential Certificates of Origin (PCOs) as at 19 January 2025

RCEP

Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP)

The Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) Agreement is designed to broaden and deepen ASEAN's engagement with Australia, China, Japan, Korea and New Zealand. The objective of the trade agreement is to establish a modern, comprehensive, high-quality, and mutually beneficial economic partnership that will facilitate the expansion of regional trade and investment and contribute to global economic growth and development in the region.

The decision to initiate the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) Agreement begins with the APEC Summit.

The RCEP is officially signed by 15 member states (10 ASEAN FTA partner countries after 1 January of 2020).

PRIMARY OBJECTIVES

The RCEP Agreement is designed to establish a modern, comprehensive, high-quality, and mutually beneficial economic partnership that will facilitate the expansion of regional trade and investment and contribute to global economic growth and development in the region.

The single regional free trade agreement (FTA) is also intended to strengthen regional solidarity for businesses in the region, particularly the Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs).

It is designed to create and support an open, inclusive, and rule-based multilateral trading system, which will in turn create avenues for market and employment opportunities for businesses and people within the region.

The trade agreement will allow businesses in RCEP member countries to gain access to a much wider regional market. Progressive elimination and reduction of customs duties for trade in goods across the facilitation of import and export of goods among the RCEP countries will ensure to enhance inter and intra-regional trade and investment while strengthening regional value chains.

Together with economic to spur economic growth in the region, it will also allow more seamless opening of markets, which enabling uninterrupted supply chains within the region. The trade agreement is also intended to help facilitate transparency, information exchange and better compliance for technical regulations and standards among RCEP member countries.

KEY FEATURES OF THE RCEP



Trade in Goods

Progressive elimination of tariff and non-tariff barriers substantially all trade in goods including the related chapters of rules of origin, customs procedures, sanitary and phytosanitary measures, standards, technical regulations and conformity assessment procedures and trade remedies in order to establish a free trade area among the parties.



Trade in Services

Liberalization of service sectors, including financial services, telecommunications and transport (air, land, and sea). The RCEP will be comprehensive, of high quality and substantially eliminate restrictions and/or discriminatory measures with respect to trade in services between the RCEP participating countries. Rules and obligations entered into under the RCEP will be consistent with the General Agreement on Trade in Services (GATS).

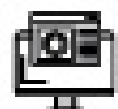


Investment

Provisional liberalization, protection and facilitation of investment. The RCEP will aim to create a liberal, facilitative, and competitive investment environment in the region through their long-term horizon to create an enabling investment environment in the region along with improved investment facilitation provisions as well as investor services.

Economic & Technical Cooperation

The economic and technical cooperation provisions in the RCEP will build upon existing economic cooperation arrangements between ASEAN and ASEAN's FTA partners to address the development gaps amongst member countries. Under the RCEP agreement, cooperation activities will also include trade activities such as trade in consumer products and services that would mutually agreed upon by the RCEP participating countries.



Protection Of Intellectual Property Rights

Standards including Protection of Intellectual Property Rights and Investment. It promotes economic integration and cooperation for the utilization, protection and development of intellectual property rights amongst RCEP member countries.

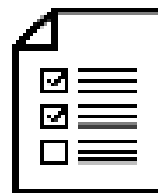
