- 1) The practice of architecture is hereby defined to be "the act of planning, architectural and structural designing, specifying, supervising, and giving general administration and responsible direction to the erection, enlargement of alterations of buildings and architectural design of engineering structures or any part thereof, the scientific, aesthetic and orderly coordination of all the processes which enter into the production of a complete building or structure performed through the medium of unbiased preliminary studies of plans, consultations, specifications, conferences, evaluations, investigations, contract documents and oral advice and directions regardless of whether the persons engaged in such practice are residents of the Philippines or have their principal office or place of business in this or other country, and regardless of whether such persons are performing one or all of these duties, or whether such duties are performed in person or as the directing head of an office or organization performing them.
- 2) The practice of Environment Planning shall include professional services in the form of technical consultation, plan preparation, and/or implementation involving the following:
 - a) Development of community, town, city or region;
 - b) Development of a site for a particular need such as housing, centers for activities concerned with research, education, culture, recreation, or government, industrial estates, agriculture, and water resources, including a spatial arrangement of buildings, utilities and communication routes;
 - c) Land use and zoning plans for the arrangement and development, preservation, conservation, rehabilitation and control of environment;
 - d) Pre-investment, pre-feasibility studies.
- 3) The practice of landscape architecture is hereby defined to be the act of planning, designing, specifying, supervising, and giving general administration and responsible direction to the functional, orderly and aesthetic arrangement, changing and development of natural scenery and land areas to produce the most desirable effect for human use and enjoyment of various outdoor spaces such as gardens, sports fields, playgrounds, recreational grounds, camping sites, resorts, national and public parks, historical parks and squares, memorial parks, subdivision parks and parkways, zoological and botanical gardens, green belts, cemeteries, plazas, patios, yards, outdoor shopping and pedestrian malls, promenades, sidewalks, road and walkway systems, traffic islands, easements and circles, roof and open interior gardens and courts, and other open spaces; the protection, conservation and rehabilitation of the natural environment and scenery to enhance the ecological system and the quality of life; the scientific coordination of all the processes which enter into the full development of such land areas performed through medium of unbiased, preliminary studies, consultations, conferences, investigations, evaluations, plans, specifications, contract documents, oral advice and direction, and teaching major landscape architecture subjects.
- 4) The practice of interior design is the act of planning, designing, specifying, supervising, and giving general administration and responsible direction to the functional, orderly and aesthetic arrangement and development of interiors of buildings and residences that shall contribute to the enhancement and safeguard of life, health and property and the promotion and enrichment of the quality if life. It shall embrace the following activities relative thereto:
 - a) Consultation, advice, direction, evaluation, estimates, appraisals, adjustments and operational programming;
 - b) Schematic designs and development, professional contract documents and constructions phases;
 - c) Preparation of preliminary technical, economic and financial feasibility studies including preparation of specialized studies;
 - d) Preparation of plans, specifications, bill of materials, project cost estimates, general conditions and their contract documents;
 - e) Interior construction and project management; administration, supervision, coordination and direction to the planning, designing, construction, renovation, demolition, alteration, preservation or restoration of building interiors;
 - f) The practice of interior design shall also include all other works, projects and activities which require the professional competence of the interior designer, including teaching of interior design subjects and computer-aided design.
- 5) The practice of civil engineering shall embrace services in the form of consultation, design, preparation of plans, specifications, estimates, erection, installation and supervision of the construction of streets, bridges, highways, railroads, airports and hangars, portworks, canals, river and shore

improvements, lighthouses, and dry docks; buildings, fixed structures for irrigation, flood protection, drainage, water supply and sewage works; demolition of permanent structures; and tunnels. The enumeration of any work in this section shall not be construed as excluding any other work requiring civil engineering knowledge and application.

- 6) "Practice of electrical engineering" a person is deemed to be in the practice of electrical engineering when he renders or offers to render professional electrical engineering service in the form of:
 - 1. Consultation, investigation, valuation and management of service requiring electrical engineering knowledge;
 - 2. Design and preparation of plans, specifications and estimates for electrical power system, power plans, power distribution system including power transformers, transmission lines and network protection, switch gear, building wiring, electrical machines, equipment and others;
 - 3. Supervisions of erection, installation, testing and commissioning of power plants, substation, transmission lines, industrial plants and others;
 - 4. Supervisions of operation and maintenance of electrical equipment in power plants, industrial plants, watercrafts, electric locomotives and others;
 - 5. Supervisions on the manufacture and repair of electrical equipment including switchboards, transformers, generators, motors, apparatus and others;
 - 6. Teaching of electrical engineering professional subject; and
 - 7. Taking charge of the sale and distribution of electrical equipment and systems requiring engineering calculations or applications of engineering data.
- 7) Geodetic Engineer any person, except geodetic engineering or surveying students and graduates who perform geodetic engineering work under the supervision of a registered geodetic engineer instructor for the purpose of training, shall be deemed to be practicing geodetic engineering within the meaning and intent of this Act, who shall, with or without, fee, salary or other reward or compensation:
 - a. Perform professional services as geodetic engineer; or
 - b. Survey and prepare plan of land from registration in the registry of property without a registered geodetic engineer's supervision; or
 - c. Undertake any work in which a transit, theodolite, and/or tape is used, for the purpose of property registration;
 - d. Survey and prepare topographic, hydrographic and economic maps for social, economic and engineering studies or planning; or
 - e. Be engaged as instructor or professor in a technical subject in any geodetic engineering course in any school or college; Provided, That this provision shall not apply to military or nautical school.
- 8) Practice of Mechanical Engineering A person shall be deemed to be practicing mechanical engineering or rendering mechanical engineering service when he performs the following :
 - 1. Consultation, valuation, investigation and management services requiring mechanical engineering knowledge;
 - 2. Engineering design, preparation of plans, specifications and projects studies or estimates for mechanical equipment, machinery, or processes of any mechanical works, projects or plants;
 - 3. Management or supervision of the erection, installation, alteration,, testing and commissioning of mechanical equipment, machinery, or processes in mechanical works,, project or plants;
 - 4. Management, supervision, operation, tending or maintenance of any mechanical equipment, machinery or processes in mechanical work, projects or plants;
 - 5. Management or supervision of the manufacture, sale, supply or distribution of mechanical equipment, parts or components;
 - 6. Teaching of mechanical engineering professional subjects in government recognized and accredited engineering schools; and
 - 7. Employment in government as a professional mechanical engineer, registered mechanical engineer, or certified plant mechanic if the nature and character of his works is in line with his profession, requiring professional knowledge of the science of mechanical engineering.
- 9) Sanitary Engineering The practice of Sanitary Engineering shall embrace the following activities:

- a. Sanitary surveys, reports design, direction, management, consultation, and investigation of :
 - 1. Water purification plants, water collection and distribution systems, reservoirs, drainage and sewer systems, sewage treatment plants, malaria control structures for public health and welfare.
 - 2. Projects relating to stream pollution, insect and vermin control or eradication, rural and camp sanitation, and milk and food sanitation.
 - 3. Systems for prevention of atmospheric pollution or the control of indoor air, especially by the air or working spaces in industrial establishments. (industrial hygiene engineering).
- b. Professional research and laboratory work supporting the activities listed in subsection (a).
- c. The term "sanitary engineer" shall mean a person duly registered with the Board of Examiners in the manner as hereinafter provided.

10) Practice of Electronics and Communications Engineering:

- A. Basic investigation and research leading to or resulting in the design or manufacture/production or development or control/measurement of new or improved communications and/or electronics components, devices, techniques and /or procedures.
- B. Design, planning, and specification of the construction, installation, provision/procurement, and/or manufacture/production of electronics and/or communications equipment and/or systems and, also, of the implementation of new or changed electronics/communications applications, developments, operations or processes inclusive of the control measurement of all these-particularly where these involve non-routine engineering calculations consideration of economic and social factors and/or provision of professional advice to client or employer.
- C. Teaching of electronics and/or communications engineering fundamentals and/or the related advance knowledge thereof and training in the pertinent applications of said fundamental and/or advance knowledge to the investigation, planning, design, development, manufacture/production, control/measurement, implementation and/or administration /supervision of communication and/or electronics components, devices, systems, operations, processes or services and particularly where such teaching and training are of collegiate level and lead to a BS degree.
- D. Administration, management and/or supervision of the activities in A.,B.,C. of this section or of the operation and/or maintenance of electronics and/or telecommunications devices/equipment and/or systems/networks and/or services.
- 11) Financial auditing services covers examination of the accounting records and other supporting evidence of an organization for the purpose of expressing an opinion as to whether financial statement of the organization present fairly its position as at a given date and the results of its operation for the period ended on that date in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.
- 12) Accounting reviews services cover review services of an annual and interim financial statements and other statements and other accounting information. The scope of a review is less than that of an audit and therefore the level of assurance provided is lower.
