Distinguished colleagues,

Ladies and gentlemen,

It is indeed an honour and privilege for me to be chairing this virtual MRT meeting today. It is most heartening that, despite the <u>varying time zones</u> that we are in, all of us have made it a <u>priority</u> to be here at this meeting.

We meet in <u>extraordinary times</u>. Confronted by a <u>crisis</u> as yet <u>unprecedented</u> in recent memory, we find ourselves at a <u>crossroads</u> of sorts.

The crisis has tested us to the limit, and has forced us to <u>make</u> <u>hard choices</u>. BUT, it has also enabled us to <u>adapt to new</u> <u>norms</u> and perhaps even <u>embrace accelerated adoption</u> of <u>new</u> <u>technologies</u> that have become pivotal in our path towards recovery. Even this meeting, the first ever fully virtual MRT, is a <u>testament</u> to our <u>inventiveness</u> of <u>turning crisis into</u> <u>opportunity</u>.

A famous poet philosopher once told us that "Humankind cannot bear very much reality." But then again, there is merit in the saying that <u>one's true character</u> becomes <u>apparent</u> during <u>times</u> of <u>hardship</u>. I would like to believe that the COVID-19 crisis has brought out the best in all of us. In the face of great adversity, we have demonstrated <u>remarkable will</u>, <u>endurance</u>, <u>strength</u> and <u>character</u>. In combatting this pandemic, we have shown that <u>APEC</u> is a <u>cohesive</u>, <u>committed</u> and <u>courageous</u> regional organisation.

<u>Consensus–building</u> in APEC has not been without its <u>challenges</u>. Despite this, we managed to successfully issue the <u>MRT Statement on COVID-19</u>, two months ago. This is an <u>accomplishment</u> to be <u>celebrated</u>, and we should certainly <u>applaud</u> the fact that this was the <u>first time</u> in the <u>history of APEC</u> that an <u>MRT Statement</u> has been <u>drafted</u>, <u>negotiated</u> and <u>finalised</u>, virtually in its entirety.

Distinguished colleagues,

To do battle, we need more than words and, in this regard, our <u>MRT Statement on COVID-19 stands out as being action-</u><u>driven</u> and <u>results-oriented</u>.

In our Statement, we had recognised that <u>our battle against</u> <u>COVID-19</u> must focus on two fronts, namely <u>health</u> and <u>economy</u>. As such, while we must be guided by global health organisations to address the health-related aspects of this crisis, the <u>economic issues</u> that have emerged must be remedied <u>swiftly</u> and <u>effectively</u> by <u>APEC</u>. It is in this context that <u>we must offer leadership</u>, and navigate the Asia Pacific towards a path of economic recovery. We must <u>act decisively</u> to bring APEC Economies back on track and propel the trajectory of growth.

The <u>COVID-19 crisis</u> has also had a <u>devastating effect</u> on <u>Malaysia's host year</u>. But, I remain confident that, with all your support and encouragement, we can still <u>deliver a meaningful</u> <u>APEC 2020</u> for the people of this region.

It is perhaps safe to say that <u>things have changed considerably</u> since we first took over the Chairmanship. And as such, we have had to <u>temper</u> our <u>expectations</u> and <u>pivot</u> our <u>priorities</u> for the year. Nevertheless, <u>we take heart</u> in the <u>strength</u> of our <u>convictions</u> and <u>commitment</u> to succeed in our endeavours, come what may. At its <u>core</u>, the <u>fundamentals</u> of what we wish to pursue as a region remains the same, and that is, <u>prosperity</u> <u>for our people</u>. What has and will continue to evolve, is the

ecosystem that enables prosperity, including resilience, adaptability and agility.

Robust economic growth, enhanced APEC-wide trade and deeper regional integration have resulted in wealth and stability for <u>APEC</u>. Poverty levels in APEC have been reduced from 62.6% in 1990, to 8.6% in 2018. In addition, the real GDP of the region has increased from USD 19 trillion in 1989 to USD 46.9 trillion in 2018.

However, prosperity as a result of economic growth has not permeated across all segments of our communities, and this has led to a growing sense of disenchantment concerning regionalism as being ineffective. This is a fallacy that we must dispel, for while we recognise the symptoms, we must not misdiagnose the cause.

The path to a <u>more prosperous Asia Pacific</u> is founded on <u>our</u> <u>resolute determination</u> for a <u>free</u>, <u>fair</u>, <u>non-discriminatory</u> and <u>predictable</u> trade and investment environment. <u>APEC</u> has always <u>come down on the side of liberalisation</u>, rather than protectionism.

Regionalism must remain the most effective means to redress the inequities and socio-economic disparities among our Economies. BUT more than ever, as we slowly but surely emerge from this crisis, the idea of ensuring that <u>prosperity</u> is <u>felt</u> by all our people has become <u>mandatory</u>. It is for this reason that the <u>principle of shared prosperity must continue to</u> <u>be infused</u> in the <u>APEC agenda</u> and reinforced in <u>ABAC work</u>. As the Chair, I remain steadfast in my belief that we must realise this aspiration.

At the same time, we must <u>strike a balance</u> between <u>safeguarding precious human lives</u> and <u>protecting livelihoods</u>, while <u>ensuring</u> the <u>resilience</u> of our <u>economy</u>. It is not a zerosum game and we cannot compromise one against the other. We must also <u>demonstrate</u> a <u>greater commitment</u> to ensure that <u>economic opportunities</u>, <u>technological solutions</u> and <u>healthcare systems</u> are <u>accessible</u> and <u>affordable</u> to all, particularly those in the <u>informal economic sectors</u>, <u>marginalised</u> and <u>under-represented groups</u> as well as <u>women</u> and <u>youth</u>.

Distinguished colleagues,

Our meeting today takes on a <u>greater significance</u> as never before. A crisis of this magnitude requires a <u>multifaceted</u> <u>response</u>, and the stakes is at an all-time high. Failure, therefore, is not an option.

The <u>world is looking to APEC</u> to <u>offer a pathway</u> and <u>identify a</u> <u>set of concrete actions</u> that could remedy the adverse impact of the COVID-19 crisis. This is a real and significant opportunity for us to demonstrate that <u>APEC does walk the talk</u>.

Of <u>immediate priority</u> is for us to <u>endorse</u> the <u>Declaration</u> to <u>Facilitate</u> the <u>Movement</u> of <u>Essential Goods</u> in <u>APEC</u>. This

Declaration is a <u>clear indication</u> of our <u>commitment</u> to <u>ensure</u> that <u>essential goods</u> remain <u>accessible</u> even in times of crisis. I understand that <u>consensus</u> on this <u>Declaration</u> remained elusive for some time. However, within this week, we managed to <u>work collaboratively</u> and, finally, <u>found middle-ground</u> <u>solutions acceptable</u> to all. I must thank all the Economies for <u>working tirelessly</u> to make this <u>Declaration</u> a <u>reality</u>.

Secondly, our Senior Officials have also elevated the <u>proposal</u> to facilitate the <u>essential movement of people</u> across borders, within APEC, for our <u>notation</u>. I do hope that work at the officials' level in this area will be expedited.

Thirdly, there are <u>two other key initiatives</u> still being <u>deliberated</u> at the officials' level. Let us take this opportunity to instruct our Senior Officials to <u>prioritise</u> the <u>work</u> on the APEC COVID-19 Latest & Immediate Virtual Exchange (<u>LIVE</u>), a <u>digital platform</u> that collects and shares information on policies and measures by Economies, in response to the COVID-19 crisis. I do hope to see an <u>early realisation</u> of this <u>platform</u>.

I understand that discussions are also ongoing to advance the <u>proposal</u> to create an <u>APEC Sub-fund</u> for APEC Cooperation on Combating COVID-19 and Economic Recovery. Let us hope to see <u>some concrete deliverables</u> on these <u>proposals</u>, by the <u>AMM</u>.

Last but not least, I also wish to share that we have been making <u>steady progress</u> on the <u>Post-2020 Vision</u>. Indeed, I am pleased to hear that the <u>SOM Dedicated Session</u> held on <u>16</u>

<u>July 2020</u> saw <u>lively</u> and <u>robust discussions</u> on the Draft Vision. The <u>SOM Chair's team</u> is presently <u>consolidating comments</u> on this Draft, for further <u>revisions</u> and <u>circulation</u> by the end of this month.

As the SOMs have been scheduled to meet once every three to four weeks, I am hopeful that we can <u>finalise</u> the <u>Vision</u> by the end of this year, in time for launch by our Leaders. In this context, I also seek the <u>kind intervention</u> of your <u>good office</u> in <u>mandating our officials to exercise the necessary flexibility</u> to find the <u>appropriate landing zones</u> for the <u>core elements</u> and <u>enablers</u> contained in the Vision, as follows:

- Resilience
- Shared Prosperity
- Sustainability and Inclusivity
- Regional Economic Integration
- Digital Economy
- Innovation
- Human Capital Development
- Structural Reforms

Colleagues, this brings us to the end of my Opening Remarks. I do look forward to our constructive discussions today.
